Get Involved

Purpose: The purpose of the Americanism program is to promote patriotism and responsible citizenship. *Standing Rules #6, Core National Standing Committees*

Be knowledgeable on flag history, etiquette, and proper disposal methods, and promote the observation of patriotic holidays so your community will look to the ALA for information.

- Work with The American Legion to increase respect for the flag in your community, including the proper way the American flag should be flown.
- At schools and organizations, teach proper handling, displaying, and respect for the American flag, as well as our National Anthem, and the Pledge of Allegiance.
- Organize a patriotic holiday event or volunteer for local patriotic events in Auxiliary attire and network with prospective members.
- Sign up at https://www.legion.org/flag/246720/sign-american-legion-flag-alerts to receive notifications on when to display the flag at half-staff.
- Contact and ask state and federal government representatives to support the flag amendment. To find your representatives, visit https://www.usa.gov/elected-officials.
- Encourage members to participate in and utilize Wreaths Across America patriotic curriculum. For more information, visit https://learn.wreathsacrossamerica.org/teach.
- Recruit others to support the flag amendment by explaining what it is and why it is important. Sign up for The American Legion's legislative action alerts and follow the flag issues.
- Work with schools and organizations to promote Star Spangled Kids. For more information and resources, visit https://member.legion-aux.org/Member/Committees/Americanism/How-to-Promote-Star-Spangled-Kids.
- OHIO Be the go-to organization in your community for flag promotion and protection. Be active in observing patriotic holidays. Encourage flying the flag every day. Be knowledgeable on flag history, etiquette, and proper disposal.
- OHIO Participate in the Pocket Flag project by providing flags to deployed troops. Publish flag etiquette tips in the local newspaper and on social media. Model respect for the flag at public events.
- OHIO Teach flag awareness in your local schools, giving flags to the schools. Teach youth about folding the flag. Have a veteran explain the folds. Involve students in flag retirement ceremonies, learning the proper way to dispose of the flag.

HOW TO PROMOTE "STAR SPANGLED KIDS"

Star Spangled Kids: Educate youth on the history of the United States from the aspect of patriotism, Americanism, and the U.S. Constitution.

- In conjunction with local schools, create a Unit Citizenship Award for children and youth who have demonstrated the ideals of the U.S. Constitution.
- Team with the Education chairman to bring veterans or servicemembers into the classroom to talk about what their service means to defending the ideals of the Constitution.
- Share "Fascinating Facts about the U.S. Constitution" each month in the department or unit bulletin, in tweets, or in a newspaper editorial.
- List important constitutional dates by chronological order or by month.
- Encourage students to test their knowledge of the Constitution.
- Distribute patriotic coloring book pages for children in primary grades.
- Celebrate Constitution Day (also known as Citizenship Day) on September 17, the day set aside each year to commemorate the signing of the U.S. Constitution.
 - o Celebrate at September's Junior meeting with a cake or cupcakes.
 - O Let Juniors report on different sections of the Bill of Rights
- Print and distribute pocket copies of the U.S. Constitution for school children and/or Juniors.
- Put on a skit or musical about the Constitution and the signers.
- Hold a scavenger hunt in the post where children find information relating to the Constitution.
- Have members dress up as signers of the Constitution and describe the role of their character in the writing and signing of the Constitution.
- Encourage high school-aged students to use their knowledge of the U.S. Constitution by participating in The American Legion Oratorical Contest.



2023 Youth Service Project!

Remember - Honor - Teach

Veterans, active-duty military, police officers and firefighters are all examples of people who currently serve or have served our country or our communities! Many, if not all, will tell you the benefits of their service to others far outweighs any sacrifices or hardships they might have encountered as a result of their service. Individuals who serve selflessly in any capacity exhibit all of the attributes of a Veteran's Wreath. A person does not have to be in the military to serve.

WHY is it important?

Now more than ever, our youth need to understand the importance of service to others, not just for the extrinsic rewards-badges, ribbons, or community service hours for college, etc., but for the intrinsic rewards, which leads to:

- more effective learning.
- higher rates of persistence when attempting to learn or achieve something new.
- greater problem-solving skills.
- improved decision-making skills.
- forming a connection between local concerns and global problems.
- a sense of accomplishment while contributing to their community.

All of these skills are necessary for students to develop to their maximum potential academically, but they are also skills that will help to instill positive character traits that will stay with them for a lifetime. With that in mind, Wreaths Across America is excited to launch its **2023 WAA Youth Service Project!**

WHO can participate?

Young people of all ages and grade levels! Teachers, parents, and family members are encouraged to participate-the younger the child, the more guidance they will need from the adults in their lives who can model what service and success looks like.

WHAT does the student need to do?

This project encourages young people to develop, organize, and execute a community service project to improve the lives of Veterans or others in their local community or the global community.

WHEN does the project need to start and when should it be completed?

The project can take place anytime between March 30, 2023, and November 11, 2023. The project can be a one day only project or may take several months to complete, but it must be completed no later than Veterans Day 2023.

WHERE does the project need to take place?

The community service project can take place anywhere. The students may choose a project in their community or one that encompasses a larger scale.

HOW do I get started?

- 1. First, for younger participants, define 'Community Service' as unpaid work performed by a person or group of people for the benefit and betterment of their community. Ask participants why it is important to help people who are in need.
- **2.** Explain that community service can take many different forms. For example, conducting a canned food drive for your local food bank, or raising money to help a local charity that provides food and other necessities for a local animal shelter, or providing school supplies (for students whose families may have fallen on hard times).
- **3.** Evaluate the needs in your local community. Discuss some of the opportunities available for participants* to perform a community service project to "serve" Veterans or others in your local community.
- **4.** Brainstorm ideas for a Community Service Project participants can perform successfully!
- 5. Pick a project. Discuss the various ideas from the brainstorming activity, allow the participants to select a project they can complete. Choose a name for the project. Tell participants to write the name of their project on the Service-learning Form. Once students have decided on a project, complete the WAA 2023 Youth Service Project Submission Form.
- 6. Discuss the next steps for their project. Participants should list the steps on the Service-learning Form. This could include making posters, or flyers to advertise their project.
- 7. Examine ways parents, family members and friends can help the participants with their Service-learning Project. Tell the students to write this on their Service-learning Form.
- **8.** Decide a start and end date for your project. Tell the participants to write the dates on the Service-learning Form. This will help the participants to establish goals for their project, for example, if the project is to provide 20 blankets to a homeless shelter, the participants should establish a timeline for accomplishing each part of the project. Celebrate the milestones and adjust their goals as necessary.
- 9. Send an email/note home to parents, letting them know about the project! Make sure to include the form Parental Permission Slip. The type of project and the age of the participants will determine how much help they may need from parents and family members. For example, if they decide to write thank you cards, they may only need parents to help with postage, if they conduct a sock campaign, or a 'Bring Your Change for Change' Fundraiser, they will need a few more resources.
- **10.** Conduct a debriefing when the project is complete. Ask students to write a short paragraph about their project, or video their response to questions about what they learned.
- **11.** A follow-up assessment will be emailed to all individuals who register their project online with Wreaths Across America.

^{*}Participants-refers to students, troop members, groups, clubs or any young people who actively participate in the project.
