I hope you all had a wonderful Christmas and a very Happy New Year. So let's start out 2019 with another Community Service Project. Martin Luck King, JR. Day.

HOW TO PARTICIPATE IN A MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR., DAY OF SERVICE
January 21, 2019

History: In 1994, Congress passed the King Holiday and Service Act, designating Martin Luther King, Jr., Day (observed on the third Monday of January) as a national day of volunteer service. Instead of a day off from work or school, Congress asked Americans of all backgrounds and ages to celebrate Dr. King's legacy by turning community concern into citizen action.

Participating on This Day:

The intention of the American Legion Auxiliary is to promote patriotic community service activities and to build community partnerships. Our service on this day elevates our presence in the community while focusing on the needs of our national heroes. It is encouraged not to use this day for membership recruitment purposes, but to approach this holiday as an opportunity to serve veterans in accordance with our mission.

Ways to Serve:

Here are six ideas to serve veterans on Martin Luther King, Jr., Day:

1. Help veterans in their home. Examples of these projects include building wheelchair ramps, basic home repairs and yard work. a. See How to Help Veterans Around Their Home
2. Organize or participate in a stand down. a. See How to Plan a One-Day Homeless Veteran Health Fair
3. Host a job fair for veterans at a post, community center or library. a. See How to Organize a Job Fair for Veterans
4. Organize a mid-year school supply drive for military children. To maximize effectiveness, collaboration with other units in your district and/or area is recommended. a. See How to Organize a School Supply Drive for Military Children
5. Encourage Juniors to create Hero Packs, in conjunction with Operation: Military Kids, to be given to military kids who have a deployed family member. a. See How to Partner with Operation: Military Kids
6. Bring at least one new person (this can be a member that doesn't normally volunteer or a nonmember) along as you visit with veterans at VA Medical Centers or state veterans homes.

Did you send me a mid-year report? I have received several reports but I know there are those of you who have something to report but maybe just forgot to send anything? There is still time! I will be working on my report to the Central Division and National Chairmen but I can always add to my report before I send it right after the first of the January. Have you contacted your schools to assure they have all the scholarship applications? What did you do for American Education Week? I could also use pictures for those of you who have them. I cannot report if I do not know all the good things your unit has done in your schools and community.

It is hard to believe the school year is very close to the mid-year mark. What has your unit done to aid the education process in your local schools? It is this time of year that students need to replenish their school supplies. This would be a good time to look at the National's "Give 10 to Education" program. Crayons and pencils are wearing down. Students have been busy filling pages of notebooks and filler paper and it is taking a lot of tape to hold folders together. With the cold season in full swing your schools might need Kleenex tissues and hand sanitizer. Make sure to check with the school as to what kind of hand sanitizer they are allowed to use. Playgrounds get cold and so do little hands and heads for children who do not have hats and gloves when it is time to go out for recess so check with your schools for students' needs.

If you have not already brought Auxiliary scholarship forms to your high schools, do that now. All scholarship forms are due to the units by March 1, 2019. Make sure to give students plenty of time to obtain the necessary papers, letters of recommendation and forms they need in order to be eligible for the scholarships. If you are a Unit President, **please** help the students by checking that all information is attached and all blanks are filled before signing the scholarship form. Make sure the student has signed the application. If all forms and letters are not in order by the time the application gets to me, the student will not be eligible to receive the scholarship. There is no sense for me to send a scholarship application to Central Division if it is incomplete. In the past that has been a problem with students not having all the necessary paperwork. Therefore, they cannot move onto Central Division missing a component of the application. The list of what they need is on the front of the application so use that as your checklist when signing the application.

Could your unit sponsor its own scholarship? If you have the funds to do so, check with your school's guidance counselor as to how you can set up a scholarship in your unit. The guidance counselor can help with setting guidelines to use. Even if your funds are limited, any amount helps when it comes to higher education whether it is a technical school or college. Fifty or hundred dollars will help buy books. You could present the scholarship at an awards assembly at the end of the school year giving attention to your auxiliary unit as sponsoring the scholarship. Remember our need to brand ourselves.

The Continuing Education Scholarships are in the process of being confirmed. The Continuing Education Scholarship as stated on the title page of the application was established to help "meet the needs of **upperclassmen**." Unfortunately, many of the applications this year were from freshman or first year students which are not classified as upperclassmen. It was stated in the previous two bulk mailings the student must have completed one year of classes in order to apply. It would not be fair for the students who were told they could not apply because they were only freshmen and then turn around and give a scholarship to those freshmen who ignore that statement and applied anyway.

Have you contacted your American Legion Post to see if you have veterans that would be willing to go into the schools and talk to the students for the Veterans in our Community Schools program? Do you do a flag etiquette

program in your school? With Presidents' Day in a couple of months schools will be looking for patriotic programs. This would be a good time to implement our programs.

Do you have military families in your community? Have you made contact with those families to see how your unit can help them adjust to having a deployed parent? What activities can you do to help a family get involve and help ease any anxiety for the children? How can you help the parents and children get involved with the community and social organizations? Could you set up a babysitting service so the non-deployed parent could take college classes or just have time to do something for themselves? This would be a good activity to get your Juniors involved. We need to keep those Juniors interested in what the Auxiliary does.

Please continue to your Education Program and make sure to keep hours and money spent so that you can have it ready for your annual reporting. I would love to hear from all units in the Department this April 15, 2019.

I would like to encourage you to request to be part of the ALA Education Program on Facebook. This would be a way to share and get ideas from other units.

Objective:

Record the American Legion Auxiliary’s history through the eyes of its members.

Background Information

The history of the American Legion Auxiliary begins in November 1919 and continues with you. The organization’s history, like any other history, is more than names and dates. It is about its membership and how it developed the ALA’s programs and projects to fulfill our mission of serving veterans, military, and their families who sacrifice so much for this country of ours. A written history can only tell so much. However, when an organization’s history is told through the eyes of its membership, everyone learns a great deal more about who we are, what we do, and why we matter.

Step-by-Step Instructions

Here are some tips:

- This is a two-person project, so find someone to assist you. This is a good time to enlist the help of your Junior members and/or college students due to their experience with technology.
- Find long time members of the Auxiliary and ask them to share their stories in a video. These stories can be about:
 - A special project;
 - A particular highlight during her years of membership;
 - How many generations of her family have been members and why;
 - If a chartered member, her experience in starting the unit.
- Find a location where it is quiet and where there will be no interruptions.
- Record with smartphones and devices. Please keep in mind that your video file must be either a .mov, .avi, .mpeg, or a .wmv file extension.
- Each recording should be no longer than five minutes in length. You may make more than one. Cover one topic in each video.

We can make this time of year better by supporting our veterans in our communities by adopting a veteran's family by giving them a gift card to a local grocery store to allow the family to buy a Christmas meal for them to enjoy.
