

Fresh new ideas are about to embark on the 2024 session of ALA Buckeye Girls State. After many new years of reviewing the delegate surveys, the 2023-2024 Buckey Girls State Board of Directors and Buckeye Girls State Coordinator have taken on the task of "listening to the former delegates and their concerns and possible changes." The Buckeye Girls State Board is diligently working on the NEW program and bringing fresh and new ideas to the 2024 BGS session.

New guidelines have been implemented and we encourage all units to thoroughly read the Program Action Plan. 2024 Buckeye Girls State applications are now available and ready to be mailed out the door to the Buckeye Girls State Chairman. The DEADLINE FOR APPLICATIONS IS FEBURARY 15, 2024.

In addition to the material in the Program Action Plan, the mandatory Buckeye Girls State orientations have been set and will be mailed with each delegate and alternate application. Remember that the delegates and alternates must attend one of the orientations and we have a wide range of dates and areas to be covered. This is very vital to the program as the changes will be addressed in the orientations.

We also encourage the Units to donate to the Buckeye Girls State Endowment Fund for the scholarships that are presented to the chosen delegates during the last session of Buckeye Girls State on Saturday. These scholarships are given to those delegates who fill out the scholarship application and they will be interviewed during the 2024 session of Buckeye Girls State.

American Legion Auxiliary Buckeye Girls State will once again be held on the campus of Bowling Green State University June 9-15, 2024. More information will be made available as the program is enhanced.

At the Midwinter Conference to be held January 19-20, 2024, in Columbus we will once again hold a workshop and the new program will be announced in detail at that time. The Board has worked closely with each of the Directors to bring new ideas and concepts to the program and I encourage every unit to send a representative to this workshop. Please be coherent to the Buckeye Girls State Board of Directors with the changes and remember this is a "LIFETIME OF DREAMS" for the delegates.

Wade Park is finally opening up some and letting us come in and do more. We have been coming in on Mondays serving coffee and cookies in the Atrium. The patients really like it when they are served donuts or other types of food items. Seeing them smile and talk with them is something that never gets old.

I have been able to provide patients with items that they are always in need of, especially toiletries. Not only do the hospital patients need them, but the women's clinic and the DOM can also use them. They are also in constant need of sweat tops and bottoms especially the larger sizes.

We are able to have our patients come to our posts again. You can call Desmond and he will help you with how many you would like to have.

The patients have been asking about when we will be coming back to play bingo. For the first time since covid we are able to do that again. Be aware that the rec center is much smaller than it used to be. If you are doing payouts with canteen books you have to order them. They will have them ready in a day or so.

With Christmas around the corner, they are letting different organizations bring gifts to the floors. They still want you to call and talk to Desmond to make sure the floors are open with no outbreaks on them. They are asking everyone not to put candy and sweets in the bags and only to give baked chips. For Christmas this year they are asking for Amazon gift cards so patients can order what they want. Last year many patients bought cup holders and different things to use on their wheelchair and scooters.

As always we are always asking for volunteers. If you have the time and would like to come to help, please feel free to contact me.

With November here I will be starting up our "Soup to Go" lunches for the patients (no employees) that come to the VA along with their caregiver and/or driver. We did several last year and all of the veterans really enjoyed them. It was nice because they could either eat it there at the clinic or take it home. I had one on Thursday, November 9th for Veterans Day, but this time it was a "Soup and Slider" to go lunch. Along with the soup they will be getting a slider sandwich. They also get a cookie or brownie (depending on which one I order), a piece of fruit, and a small bag of candy. On special days (like Veterans Day, Valentine's Day and Memorial Day) I will also be putting a gift card in their bag. But the gift cards are only for the veterans, not the caregiver or driver.

By the time you have received this Buckeye Messenger we will have a new Speaker of the House. Hopefully the National Defense Authorization Act will have been passed too. But if this hasn't happened, we are called to contact our congressmen to pass H.R. 5641 Pay our Troops Act and H.R. 2639 Pay the Coast Guard Act. If these are not passed and the government goes into shutdown, they will not have continued pay.

Another concern of the American Legion is the supporting of H.R. 1139 Governing Unaccredited Representatives Defrauding (GUARD) VA Benefits Act. This is to protect our sick veterans from the ambulance chasers, to control the fees that lawyers can charge. Currently the H.R. 1822 PLUS for Veterans Act is gaining ground. This one will allow the unaccredited lawyers to charge up to a \$12,500 upfront fee. We do not want this. Call, email and write to your reps!

Yes on H.R. 1139 No on H.R. 1822

But please note that this is a time our members may want to step back from using Be the One as a theme. Remember: This serious topic is not just an ALA focus, but an American Legion Family mission. We would love for people to use Be the One, but only as a stand-alone to really drive the importance of its mission.

ALA National Headquarters has several awareness plans incoming for members, including social media posts, a blog post, magazine story, and discussions at upcoming trainings, so that all levels of the organization are hearing the same message. You can also go to www.ALAforVeterans.org to watch the Be the One webinar in the ALA Academy.

Talking points on how to use the phrase "Be the One"

We know ALA members are playing a big role in supporting the Be the One mission. However, tying the phrase into a theme is diminishing the power of the words *Be the One.* We understand the tradition of having themes and we are not pointing fingers, punishing anyone, or assigning blame. However, our members may want to step back from using Be the One as a theme. Remember: This serious topic is not just an ALA focus, but an American Legion Family mission.

- Be the One is about suicide prevention and awareness.
- It originated as be the one to save one. It's estimated that between 17 and 22 veterans or servicemembers take their own lives each day.
- It's not a catchphrase. It's not a campaign. The American Legion is now calling it a mission.
- It's a mission to destigmatize asking for mental health support, provide peer-topeer support and resources, and educate everyone on how they can Be the One.
- The American Legion Auxiliary and Sons of The American Legion joined The American Legion to promote the Be the One mission. So, ALA members should follow the guidelines from The American Legion. Go to BetheOne.org to learn more.
- The words "Be the One" should not be use as part of a lighthearted theme, to invite someone to a meeting, or to pay their dues. Uses other than suicide prevention/ awareness diminish its power.
- Use of "Be the One" should be reserved for topics related to suicide prevention and awareness.
 - The No. 1 issue facing the veteran community is suicide.
- The approved logos for Be the One are subject to the same usage rules as The American Legion brandmark.
- Think of Be the One as a standalone phrase such as "Just Do It" and "Got Milk". How can you Be the One?
 - Ask veterans in your life how they are doing.
 - Listen when a veteran needs to talk.
 - Reach out when you think a veteran might be struggling.
 - Increase awareness about the veteran and military suicide epidemic.
 - Have a list of resources in your area for veterans who may be struggling.
 - Spread the word about the Veterans Crisis Line at 988.

- Phrasing:
- "I move to amend the motion by inserting the word 'consecutive' before the word 'terms."
- "I move to add the words 'at a cost not to exceed \$100."
- "I move to amend by adding the following paragraph..."
- 2. To strike out (a word, consecutive words, or a paragraph). Phrasing:
 - "I move to amend by striking out the word 'every."
 - "I move to amend by striking out the words 'during the second semester."
 - "I move to strike out the third paragraph."
- 3. To strike out and insert (words) or to substitute (paragraph or entire main motion).

Phrasing:

- "I move to strike out the word 'monthly' and insert the word 'annually."
- "I move to substitute for the pending main motion the following..."

The Order of Business

- Reading and approval of minutes approves the record of actions taken at previ-
- Reports of officers and standing committees considers actions as recommended by an officer or committee. Any correspondence received should be read if not distributed prior to the meeting. A financial report is made at every meeting.
- Reports of special committees considers actions as recommended by a group formed for a particular purpose.
- Special orders considers items that were made special orders for this meeting or items required to be taken up at this meeting by provision in the bylaws.
- Unfinished business and general orders consider items not reached when the last meeting adjourned or items postponed to this meeting.
- New business considers actions proposed by members.

With the holidays being here, I know that everyone is do something for a Veteran outside a VA Facility, it counts towards your Service to Veterans Hours.

Some Examples: did you go shopping for a Veteran, give them a ride to an appointment or grocery store. Did you bake items, crochet, or knit items that are being donated to a Veteran. These are a few of the things you should keep track of for your hours and turn the hours in on the Service to Veterans paperwork. If you are not sure if you can count something you do on your Service to Veterans hours, ask and I will

Also, remember that if you take care of a Veteran who lives with you it counts as 10 hours a week and if the Veteran does not live with you, it is 5 hours a week.

Fill out one sheet per member, and fill out the information on the top of the sheet, keep a copy so that you can include these numbers in your VA&R report that you give to your Unit Chairman and make sure that everything is legible, you can send them by mail or email, and you do not have to wait until April 15th to send them to me. My email and address are on the Plan of Action you received. Also, please be specific about what you are doing for our Veterans. Remember, these hours can only be counted once and not counted again on another program's report, so decide which program you want to report the hours on. **EXAMPLE:** If you send in your hours on a Service to Veteran's report, which are to be included in your VA&R report you should not also count those hours on Community Service or National Security.

If you can send me short note letting me know some of the things your Unit is doing to promote Service to Veteran's, so your members can earn their hours, then we can share ideas with other members as to how they can also earn their hours. All members do things to help our Veterans, outside the VA Facilities, so turn in those

Remember all these hours do matter and keep being those Super Heros for our Veterans.

In conjunction with Huntsville IL Lions Club celebrating their 50th anniversary, Charles Collins American Legion Auxiliary #381 is celebrating their 100th anniversary. On May 1st, 1923, Mrs. Henery Shick served as temporary chairman of the first meeting of this organization. On September 7th, 2023, the organization applied for and was granted a permanent charter.

Second Lt. 11th Inf., A.E.F. Charles Collins, son of Mr. McConnell and Mrs. Ada Collins, was killed in action just three days before the signing of the Armistice. It is for this young soldier that the Charles Collins Post of the American Legion, at Huntsville, is named. He had four sisters residing in Bellefontaine. They were Mrs. R. E. McCleary, Miss Minnie Collins, Stella Collins, and Mrs. Donald Rhoades.

There is extensive history kept of the unit, their members, achievements, activities over the years. They gave money to the Veterans children's home, local school for books, lepers, veterans families. A 1930 report indicates that money was given to families to buy winter clothing for their children. \$5.00 was allocated for each

child. 6 tubes of toothpaste and 6 toothbrushes were sent to Dayton and Sandusky hospitals. These were gracious gifts in 1930.

Currently the organization works with local schools to provide flag etiquette classes and Veterans day programs for elementary classes, annual Poppy day, honor our deceased military by assisting with putting out flags for Memorial Day celebrations, sending over 300 Veterans day cards to veterans, recognize local residents who proudly display the American flag with I Spy Americanism Certificates, and sponsor Indian Lake high school girls to Girls' State. For more information on getting involved with our programs please contact Bev Martz, Roxie Tracey, or Nicki Trout.

The Huntsville Indian Lake Lions club celebrated their 50-year anniversary and hosted both events. They are very active in community service offering numerous scholarships for Indian Lake students, sponsoring Boys State representatives, putting out flags and taking part in the memorial day services, assisting with outreach programs as well as fulfilling ongoing service projects. The two organizations work in conjunction with other service agencies in promoting community events with a focus on children and families.
