



The Good Deed and Youth Hero awards are National awards for children and youth in your community. The Youth Hero Award is awarded to any child under the age of 18 who demonstrates a physical act of valor (Heimlich, CPR, first aid, rescuing from fire or water peril). The award serves as an inspirational role model for the organization and the community. The Good Deed Award is for the child under 18 years of age who donates time and/or money for a worthy cause (such as troop support, raising money to help homeless veterans, a food drive, etc.). You can contact the schools, churches or service organizations to find these students. Watch for news stories in the newspaper or on social media to help find worthy students. In honor of the American Legion Auxiliary's 102nd year of service and in support of our mission, your unit can help by supporting the National effort to achieve 102 individual recognitions for both our ALA Good Deed Award and ALA Youth Hero Award. You can do your part by downloading the forms and submitting worthy youth candidates for award recognition to the Department of Ohio.

National is excited to announce a new recognition opportunity for our program for the 2021-2022 year, the Youth Caregiver Award. The requirements for the award are students who provide care, comfort, assistance, and support to loved ones, friends or family members without being paid. This is a unit award and a certificate will be available for download from the ALA national website for units to present.

One of the Department of Ohio's objectives this year is protecting, caring for and supporting the children and youth of your community particularly the veterans and military families' and those who are homeless. This would include holding events for children that would not only be seasonal parties but also educational and learning experiences. With Veterans Day approaching, plan for a lunch, dinner or pizza party for the members of your Post and the children and grandchildren. Many children know that "Grandpa is a veteran" but might not know why he is a veteran. This would give the children an opportunity to talk to veterans and have a better understanding of what a veteran is and why "Grandpa is a veteran." In less than three months is Christmas. Start planning now for a breakfast with Santa or a Post and Unit Christmas party making it a Legion family affair. What can you do for the homeless children in your community that will not have much of a Christmas if any at all?

This year Units who have three events and submit a narrative of 300 words or less explaining the three events will receive recognition at the Department Summer Convention and a certificate. When writing the narrative include pictures, volunteer hours and money spent for your event. Record the activity as soon as it happens so it is fresh in your mind instead of waiting until spring when details can get fuzzy. It will make reporting in the spring much easier.

This past week there has been much on Facebook and its effect especially on young girls. One of your events could be an educational and learning workshop on how to handle social media and bullying. Bullying has been around forever and it will probably always be. We can help by educating our youth how to handle situations whether they are getting bullied or witnessing bullying. Invite speakers to talk to students. Contact the professionals in your community to speak; police, guidance counselor, teachers, and your district mental health department. Most are more than happy to share their information.

Does your unit have members that like to cook or bake? There are those children that love to cook. Plan a basic cooking or baking class. In 1970 the Auxiliary's Committee on Orphans of the Great War which was originally established in 1922 was changed to Children and Youth to align with the Legion's program. One of the subjects at the time was nutrition. With many of our children leaning towards obesity, what could be more important than learning basic cooking skills and how to make nutritional snacks? It could help children have a better attitude towards healthy eating and those members of your unit who enjoy cooking would have fun, too.

There are dozens of ideas to engage our children and youth. This year there is no mid-year reporting but if you have ideas, please share them with me so that I can share them with others. Make sure you are also planning for the older children, tweens and teens. It is important to make sure you give yourselves plenty of time to plan an event. Get your Juniors involved in your planning. It gives them the experience and helps you by doing some of the leg work. Who knows, it could help grow your Junior program if your Juniors are having fun and tell their friends.

If your unit is having a Halloween Party or a "Truck or Treat" night, there is a coloring book that you can download free at www.alaforveterans.org/coloring-books. The coloring book is "Have a Safe Halloween" and fits right into the objective one, protecting our children. Also available is a coloring book for the poppy. They can be purchased if you choose at emblem.legion.org or by calling 888-453-446.

Make sure that when you have events you wear your auxiliary apparel and take lots of pictures. Invite the media or make sure you have pictures and articles in the newspapers. When people see what we are doing, they might be encourage to join the Auxiliary

Hello to all the Units in the Department of Ohio!

This fall weather has had its ups and downs, but there have still been some nice days to get outside and enjoy nature, volunteer at, or attend community events. We hope you are all wearing your Auxiliary apparel while you are busy in your communities helping to serve veterans and their families.

The Plan Of Actions (POA's) were distributed at Department School of Instructions if you had a unit member there, or they were mailed to your Unit. The POA's were completely revised this year to be more user friendly with the end of the year Impact Reports. Please read your POA over very carefully as there is NEW INFORMATION, and a NEW NATIONAL AWARD this year.

Please refer to the information on the back of this sheet. It will tell you about the new National Award "CARING FOR THOSE WHO CARE FOR OTHERS" created by National President Kathy Daudistel. Who is that one Unit member who always volunteers to help in the community? One who is a caregiver? Check out the criteria for this recognition and nominate a Unit member for the award.

A new program for Department of Ohio Community Service this year is a Mental Health Initiative. Is there a link between mental illness and violence?? Most of us understand the feeling of being anxious, sad, or having no motivation. These feelings are usually temporary and will go away with time, but for some, these feelings persist. This can cause significant distress which may lead to a change in their behavior, emotions, and thinking process. If this change starts to interfere with daily life, then possibly a mental illness will be diagnosed.

With treatment and getting the proper services needed, for many, symptoms can be reduced, controlled, or managed. There are a lot of people with mental illness who live healthy, productive lives. Despite this, mental illness is usually associated with scary, unpredictable, violent behavior. (Mostly driven by the news media and entertainment industries) Research indicates, in most cases, this behavior is not due to mental illness itself, but a combination of multiple factors.

- 1. Reach out to someone you know with mental health issues. See if you can arrange the services they need from Mental Health Agencies in your community. Try to help and avoid the illness from escalating.
- 2. Contact local mental health services in your community such as NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness), Ohio MHAS (Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services), Harbor Behavioral Health. Ask them what you can do to enhance and promote the services they provide. Find out how you can help these organizations reach out to more individuals in need of their assistance. Check these resources for age specific requirements that would include young, school age children through teens.

NEW NATIONAL COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD UNIT MEMBER COMMUNITY SERVICE APPRECIATION AWARD "CARING FOR THOSE WHO CARE FOR OTHERS"

For the year 2021-2022, National President Kathy Daudistel will be focusing on the American Legion Auxiliary members in our community who care for others. We have many members who care for veterans, and they are recognized under the VA&R program.

But we also have those Unit members who do outstanding work in the community, even though they are not caregivers for a veteran. There is always that one Unit member who stands out in your community as the "go to person" to get things done in the community. A candidate for this award must be a **volunteer** who is spearheading a community project, taking care of a non-veteran community member outside of their family, visiting the homebound residents to find out their needs, or just spending time with a community member at risk. They work for the good of the community and all residents, regardless of who needs the help, and they always represent the ALA. They have great organizational skills, are compassionate, kind, and humble people. Let's reward these Unit members by recognizing their efforts with a Certificate of Appreciation.

UNIT MEMBER COMMUNITY SERVICE APPRECIATION AWARD

Each Unit may nominate **one** Unit member by submitting a narrative to the Department Community Service Chairman with a deadline requested by the Department Chairman. Each Department Community Service Chairman will submit **one** Unit member winner per Department, **by email,** to their National Community Service Divisional Chairman by June 1, 2022. Each Divisional Chairman will submit their Divisional winner to the National Chairman, Denise Conrad by June 15, 2022.

- > Candidate must be a Unit member in good standing.
- Narrative must be less than 500 words
- Please try to include the Unit member's picture (doing a task in the community OPTIONAL)
- Make sure to include Winner's name and contact information
- > Include Unit name, Department, and chairman information
- It is recommended that Units download the fillable, printable Certificate of Appreciation from the website <u>alaforveterans.org</u> on the Community Service page and present it to those members in your Unit that are considered for this award. The Units may present this certificate to more than one member in the Unit but can only send one nomination per Unit on to the Department Community Service Chairman.
- > It is recommended that the Department Chairman award a Certificate of Appreciation to all Unit members submitted to the Department Community Service Chairman for the award.

Each Divisional Unit member winner will receive a Certificate of Appreciation from National President Kathy Daudistel.

Constitution and Bylaws

All organizations are organized and conduct business and mission service according to the organization's governing documents. In ALA, the vital governing documents are its Articles of Incorporation — Constitution; ByLaws — its fundamental structure and fundamental rules; and Standing Rules — process and detailed rules that "stand" for all to follow yet can be amended as frequently needed to keep the unit functioning well.

This year, this chairman asked that after your C&B committee finishes your update, you send your revised constitution and bylaws and standing rules to me via email before you present to the unit. Why? It saves a lot of frustration and postage.

I have created a template for C&B; all you have to do is fill in the blanks. Then, send it to me, and I will review it, send it back via email with corrections if needed. Next, you presented to your unit members for approval; then, send two (2) signed copies to me for signature. Finally, I will send one (1) to the department and one (1) back to you to distribute to your members.


As far as your standing rules, I can help with that also, depending on how detailed you want them to be. Remember, standing rules are regulations or rules that deal with the unit's procedures, operations, and guidance.

Constitution and bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present at a regular Unit meeting, provided the entire membership has been notified of the proposed amendments by the medium of the press, Unit notice, or unit newsletter and also read at the previous meeting.

Standing rules may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) vote at any regularly scheduled meeting or by a majority vote if notice has been given.

We are in this together, so let's work together and get our Constitution and Bylaws and Stand Rules updated!

SUBJECT:

Unit Bonding

The National Fidelity Bond covers all members and employees of the American Legion Auxiliary. Each Unit must pay \$6.00 for its share of the bond premium. The fidelity bond covers loss through larceny, embezzlement, theft, forgery, misappropriation, willful misapplication or any other act of fraud. This bond does not cover loss, mysterious disappearance, or burglary. As soon as a loss is discovered, an audit must be conducted to establish proof of loss. All claims are to be reported to the Department Secretary within three months of discovery.

The following controls are recommended to help prevent losses and provide more reliable financial data:

- 1. Unit Bylaws should provide for a regular financial report from the Unit Treasurer.
- 2. Unit Bylaws should provide for an annual audit and specify how the audit is to be made.
- 3. Cash receipts must match the cash receipt entry in the ledger and the bank deposit.
- 4. Involve a second person in cash receipts processing.

City

- 5. Make certain cash receipts match the cash receipts entry and the actual bank deposit.
- 6. Pay all bills by check.
- 7. Issue receipts for all monies received.
- 8. Require countersignatures on all checks—NEVER pre-sign a blank check.
- 9. Someone independent of check processing should review bank statements, bank reconciliations, credit card statements, vendor addresses, etc.

 - A child identified as having a disability, but not in a special education class due to lack of facilities. Identification contingent upon discretion of school officials. (Special Needs category is dictated by National as a class)

Poppy Poster Requirements

- 1. Each poster shall have a fitting slogan not to exceed ten (10) words. The articles "a, and, an, the' are *not counted* as words. The words "buddy" and "buy", *cannot* be used.
- 2. The words "American Legion Auxiliary" must be used in the design of the poster and will not be counted in the (10) word count.
- 3. Each poster must include a picture of the red Flanders Field poppy.
- 4. The poster shall be on 11"x14" poster board. (Drawing paper will not be accepted).
- 5. The United States flag may be used, as long as there are no infractions of the flag code.
- 6. Judging Criteria
 - ✓ 50% Poster Appeal (layout, message, originality)
 - ✓ 40% Artistic Ability (design and color)
 - ✓ 10% Neatness
- 7. Media used shall be watercolor, crayon, powder or oil paint, handmade paper cutouts, ink or textures, acrylics, pencils, or markers.
- 8. Written in ink on the back of the poster (not attached) shall be the class in which the entry is submitted, the name, address, age and grade of the contestant and the name of the department.
- 9. Submissions become the property of the American Legion Auxiliary. Through submission of artwork, contestants and their legal guardians' grant non-exclusive reproduction and publication rights to the works submitted and agree to have their names and artwork published for commercial use without additional compensation or permission.
- 10. The poster shall be the work of only one individual.
- 11. The label "In Memoriam" from the veteran-made poppy may not be used.
- 12. While ALA representatives will do their best to return all posters, it is not guaranteed. We recommend participants take a picture or scan their poster for their records.

Junior Poppy Usage Contest

All Junior Units, the Poppy Usage Contest will be held at the <u>Mid-Winter Conference</u>, <u>January 24-25</u>, <u>2022</u>. The entries are designs of your own choosing using official ALA poppies and it may be any of the following nature: wreaths, centerpieces, tray favors, etc. This is an opportunity for you to share with other Junior Units your creative ideas. Attendees at the Conference will vote by a \$1.00 contribution per vote.

- All money collected will go to the National Veterans Creative Arts Festival.
- A photo of the entry that brought in the most money will be highlighted in the Buckeye Messenger.
- If your Unit has an entry, but no one is coming to Mid-Winter, try to send with a Unit who is attending.
- Each Unit should have a fundraiser for the Creative Arts Festival with sending those monies collected to Department Headquarters.

Junior Poppy Corsage Contest

The Juniors are also asked to participate in this contest! The Junior entries will be judged separately at the <u>Mid-Winter Conference</u>, <u>January 24-25</u>, <u>2022</u>. Attendees pay \$1.00 per vote and the proceeds will go to the National Creative Arts Festival. This would be a wonderful opportunity to make sure they fully understand what the Poppy represents.

- Each corsage should have the name of the creator, their Unit and District
- Be approximately 3 ½ x 3 ½ and fit in a standard 4" x 4" corsage box, any larger will be disqualified
- The entries are designs of your own choosing using official ALA poppies
- The winning corsages will be used at 2022 Buckeye Girls State Session for the City Mayor's. <u>Please note:</u> All Poppy corsages will not be returned unless that is noted at the time your entry is received.

Junior Activities Patch Program

American Legion Auxiliary Junior members and Sons of The American Legion youth members can be active participants of the organization with the Patch Program. Specific patches can be earned year-round and is ongoing with three levels of patch criteria:

- Red Level 1: Kindergarten through 3rd Grade
- Gold Level 2: 4th grade through 8th grade
- Blue Level 3: 9th grade through 12th grade (or 18 years old)

Ten scholarships, in the amount of \$2,500 each, will be awarded for 2022. Two scholarships will be awarded in each of the five divisions of the American Legion Auxiliary. All are gift scholarships, not loans.

RULES

- 1. Candidates for this award shall have been Junior members of the American Legion Auxiliary, held membership in the American Legion Auxiliary for the past three consecutive years (2019, 2020, and 2021) and be a paid member for the current (2022) membership year. Applicant must continue her membership in the American Legion Auxiliary during the scholarship period.
- 2. This scholarship is intended for the traditional college student with no interruption in education, who is at least in the first semester of college or technical school but not yet attained a bachelor's degree. Any member who is a non-traditional student (a student returning to the classroom after some time away from college) is welcome to apply for the American Legion Auxiliary Non-Traditional Student Scholarship.
- 3. This is a scholarship to attend an accredited institution of higher education for the completion of a bachelor's degree. Applicants must have completed at least one semester with grades that meet continuation requirements at the institution of their choice. Applicants must have at least a 3.0 GPA using a 4.0 scale.
- 4. Previous American Legion Auxiliary national scholarship recipients are welcome to apply.
- 5. Applicants must present the completed application, along with the other required materials specified on the following page, to the **president of their American Legion Auxiliary unit** ON OR BEFORE MARCH 1, 2022.
- 6. Judging, at all levels, shall be on the following basis:

THE DECISION OF THE JUDGES SHALL BE FINAL.

7. The first half of the award (\$1,250) will be paid directly to the school for the first semester upon notification from the school that the student has re-enrolled. *American Legion Auxiliary National Headquarters must receive certification of enrollment within 12 months of the winning recipient's notification, or the scholarship will be forfeited.* There shall be no money paid to the school for the ensuing semester until notification of re-enrollment has been received from the school. Notification from the school must include verification of at least a B (3.0 on a 4.0 scale) average. If the winner discontinues her education or membership in the American Legion Auxiliary before all scholarship funds have been dispersed, the balance of the scholarship will be forfeited. The winner will have four years from the date of notification of scholarship to use the scholarship funds.



Also, please do not forget to order your Poppies. In order to be considered for the President's Citation of Merit, you must order poppies before December 31.



Poppy Challenge: Poppy in the Window of Each Veteran

Members, senior and junior, place a poppy in the window of each Veteran in their community. This poppy will allow citizens to recognize the sacrifice of the Veteran and their family for the rights our citizens are granted today.

Engage the schools, youth organizations, churches, and Legion Family members to allow children and adults to distribute a red poppy to place in the window of a Veteran with a note provided by the Auxiliary. This note would thank the Veteran for their service and request that the poppy is placed in a window. Students using the poppy bookmark could create red poppies for sharing. This experience will allow Auxiliary members to share the poppy's history while interacting with the community.

The Introduction of the poppy, history and the Poppy Poster Contest to students creating the poppy will further explain honoring the Veterans service to our Country. Units and members can donate art supplies to make poppies, poppy cards, and delivery to Veterans in nursing homes and hospitals (another avenue of extending our mission into the community).

Suggestion: The poppies before delivery could create a Poppy Wall of Honor at a school, church, Post, or community event.

Suggestion: Members work with area businesses to create a Poppy Wall of Honor (a poppy-designed emblem with the name) within the business to honor all Veterans employed. The honored Veterans would receive a poppy and a personal thankyou.

Photos: What photos would support your story? How can you go about getting that image to use? Be persistent! The more photos, the better. When requesting and send photos, ask for the highest resolution photos possible; the best is a 1MB compressed file size. Photos less than 50KB cannot be used for the screen. Often people compress photos (they might say "res down") which means they chose a smaller file size when emailing. Request photos be sent at the highest resolution, often requiring photos sent in separate emails. Consider free large file transfer services (or an FTP site) like Dropbox or Hightail to send photos if comfortable. The Poppy Committee cannot use copied photos from Facebook or a PowerPoint.

Poppy Basics 101

We all love the bright red crepe paper poppy. Part of our appreciation for the flower lies in the lore of how it came to be an American Legion Auxiliary symbol.

From 1914-1918 The Great War (which is now known as World War I) raged across Western Europe causing extreme destruction and death. The bombing and fighting in Flanders (now Belgium and France) stirred up the soil and encouraged the growth of the papaver rhoeas; also known as the Flanders poppy, corn poppy, red poppy, and corn rose. Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, a Canadian brigade surgeon saw the poppies and felt they were a good representation of the losses. He wrote the poem "In Flanders Fields" which was spoken by the voices of the dead soldiers. It received widespread accolades and became common usage in countless ceremonies.

Moina Michael, a University of Georgia professor who was volunteering with the Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA) wrote a response to the poem which she titled "We Shall Keep the Faith" which is often referred to as "America's Answer." She tirelessly promoted the poppy as a symbol, and, in mid-1920, Georgia's branch of the American Legion adopted the poppy as its symbol. Soon after that, the National American Legion voted to use the poppy as its official U.S. national emblem when it convened in September, 1920.

The use and distribution of the poppy has expanded and grown nationally and internationally and is now an integral part of our Memorial Day ceremonies and our farewell services for our members.

Poppy FC Pattern



Aunt Lydia Classic 10 Black and Red

#5 or 6 crochet hook

R1 – Black C5 connect with slip stitch OR make a magic circle. The circle leaves a bigger hole, but is easier to do.

R2-C3 (counts as $1^{\rm st}$ DC.) DC 19 more times, slip stitch to top of C3. Should be 20 DCs

R3 – Change to Red Chain 3, DC in next stitch, C1. DC in next 2, C1 across. Slip stich to top of chain 3 to join

R4 – Slip stitch in first next DC and in chain space. 2DC, C2, 2DC in each chain space across. Join with Slip stitch in first DC.

R5 – Slip stitch over to chain 2 space, chain 3, 6DC. [SC in space between the 4 dc in row below. 7 DC in the chain space] – repeat [] to end, join, finish off.

Glue on circle of felt (I used green) to the back of the poppy. Attach self-adhesive magnetic pin or pin. Keep in mind, people who have a pacemaker cannot wear magnets.

R= Round

C=chain

DC=double crochet

Poppy Question & Answers

- How many Poppy Days can a Unit have each year?
 - They may have a s many as they wish as far as National Headquarters is concerned. However, they do need to check with their department before scheduling to ensure there aren't any rules that state otherwise at that level. Chrystal Daulton
- Request clarification on the possible situation for use of VA&R (poppy) funds. If a military member/veteran is in the hospital or home for recuperation, can poppy funds be used to assist in paying rent, etc? What documentation is necessary to support such a claim??
 - Poppy funds may be used for necessities such as rent, utilities, groceries, etc. for a veteran/servicemember in need. American Legion Auxiliary National Headquarters does not have requirements for documentation, that would come from your department headquarters. Chrystal Daulton
- A very good question was asked regarding our Poppy Challenge...Are these actual poppies (crepe paper ones) or decals? If they are decals, is there an inexpensive version? The decals from Flag and Emblem are \$2.95 each an expensive proposition if we are truly blanketing communities.
 - MaryAnn Paul's, Southern Division Chairman, listed just a few ways we can work the Poppy challenge. These are just ideas, and I'm sure you are all thinking of great ways to accomplish this.
 - A poppy card ...a postcard with a painted poppy, cut out a printed poppy and glue it on the front of the card, a hand-colored poppy or even just tape a red crepe paper poppy on it. Our Juniors could be actively involved making the poppy cards. Might even try using the "red felt Poppy" and taping it to the window.
 - Making sure the Thank You card has a poppy on the front of it and they can use that.
 - > On veteran businesses ... maybe a poppy painted window? A talented artist in your Unit...
 - > And of course, if funds permit, your Unit could purchase the poppy decals.


