

The Five W's and H of the Auxiliary Emergency Fund

Who:

Who is eligible? Persons who have been a member for the past two consecutive years and is current on dues for the membership year in which the emergency occurs. (Three consecutive years' dues)

Who funds this program? This program was created in 1969 and is supported by donations from units and members of the American Legion Auxiliary.

What:

The Auxiliary Emergency Fund is the program that embodies our devotion to our members. The Auxiliary Emergency Fund was created to provide temporary assistance to eligible members during financial crisis when no other readily available source of aid is available for food, shelter, or utilities. It is also available for temporary assistance for educational training, for eligible members who, because of some change in their life, are now the main means of support for their family. This facet is aimed at preparing a member to re-enter the workforce or upgrade their skills for a better paying position. Applications for the disaster grant or temporary assistance can be found at https://www.legionaux.org/aef.

When:

This program needs your support all year long. Disasters and financial crisis know no season.

Where:

This program should be supported in every unit across the state. These are our sisters, friends, and family that we are supporting. Maybe the person sitting next to you at your last meeting has benefitted or will benefit from the AEF.

Why:

Because it is who we are and what we do. We are a community of volunteers dedicated to serving our veterans, active duty military and their families, our children and youth, and our communities, including our own members.

How:

Be creative! You still have time to wrap gifts before Christmas for donation. Do a water bottle coin collection with a porch pick-up at a determined time. The 2021 session of Buckeye Girls State will be held on the campus of the University of Mount Union, Alliance, Ohio the week of June 13-19, 2021 – Celebrating 75 yrs!!

Important points to remember:

- 1. Since Mid-Winter has been moved to March, we will not have the benefit of the yearly workshop, so it is important that you go over your instructions and pay attention to deadline dates that will be approaching.
- We are still dealing with issues related to the COVID-19, so things may still be somewhat different this
 year when it comes to reaching out to the schools and interviewing girls. Be open and flexible when
 possible and make sure that you follow guidelines for safety.

Units should be:

- Ordering the applications remember that the deadline is March 1st and then the price goes up.
- Working closely with the school(s) to get the names of potential delegates.
- Making plans as to when and where you will conduct the interviews. Remember that it is up to the Unit to decide who will be the delegates and alternates.

Next Steps -

- Contact each girl to let her know when and where the interview will be held and to make sure she is
 available to be there. If she has a conflict, please make every attempt to reschedule her so that she
 has the opportunity to be interviewed.
- Keep the parents informed of what is happening.
- Make your final decisions and contact the girls to let them know. It is the Unit's responsibility to:
 - Make sure all parties receive the applications and that all parties complete and sign them.
 - After applications are completed and signed, be sure they are sent to Vicky Buck at the Department office.

The Board of Directors is excited and looking forward to the upcoming 2021 session. While things make look a little different, our core program has not changed, and we hope to make this session the best it can be! As we continue to move forward, we will keep you informed of any changes and it is our hope that all members and volunteers will embrace this coming year as you have in the past. It is, as always, our goal to provide a week of government learning, citizenship, and patriotism; and that the delegates come back with life-long friends and a renewed sense of their own strength and future goals.

REPORTING & WRITING A NARRATIVE



Mid-Year and End Year Reports

- Review & read the OHIO Plan Of Action (POA) to determine the objectives to accomplish during the
 year. They were mailed to the Unit President to distribute to the Unit Chairman or you can find
 them online at www.alaohio.org or you can request an email copy from the Department Chairman.
 To locate this information go to the POA What Can You Do? Ideas for the member and the unit.
- It is IMPORTANT to read <u>thoroughly and completely</u> as each program has different criteria. Some require dollar values; number of volunteers; number of veterans served (be specific "many" is not numerical); impact reports some require totally different information. One size does not fit all.
- Compile data, total numbers, activities from your members and treasurer and then determine where the information fits the Ohio POA objectives.
- If an activity crosses several Programs, decide to use the numbers on one or distribute them across the Programs that are involved.

Writing Your Unit Narrative STORY

- Think of a member you have not seen for a long time. Here's your chance to tell that member what has been happening in the unit for the year. Tell your Unit story for that <u>particular</u> program.
- Review and read the OHIO POA for program awards. Each has different criteria. Some require impact reports in order to be considered. READ CAREFULLY!
- Where to start: (hint: as leadership chairman this is what I look for)
 - o Go to the POA What Can You Do? Ideas for the member and the unit.
 - When you find the "What Can You Do" section, you will see there are subtitles on what to accomplish...go to the ideas for members and unit under that subtitle. Then decide if the unit has accomplished any of those activities in that section.
 - o Once you have gone through all the subtitles and determine the activities the unit has accomplished start writing...who, what, when, where and how.
 - o Be very specific for the program you are writing about.
 - Keep in mind that the Department Chairmen, are looking for the <u>criteria specific</u> to their program. If in doubt what to write, contract the Department Chairman and ask for advice.
 - o Trust me...you will not get it right on the first writing...it may take 3 or more times...start early...write then walk away...come back reread and rewrite...suggest you put a Revision on each copy just in case you removed something and now you want it back.
 - In Leadership, I look for information in the narrative as organized in the POA "What Can I Do".

HINTS

Just thought I'd give you some HINT of what this chairman is looking for in YOUR narrative. Pick the areas you did something in and explain **how** you accomplished them. This is just the tip of the iceberg...CHECK the POA for more details. Some narratives count as End of Year Reports...CHECK the POA. Some Chairmen would prefer the reports emailed...Check the POA.

- How did you get to know the members of your unit?
- How did you Survey members to identify their interests and skills?
- How did you develop a plan to incorporate at least one aspect of leadership learning at meetings?
- Did you hold a workshop/brunch focusing on preparation of reports and applying for awards?
- Was a membership pin and/or governing documents provide to new members and do you discuss these documents at meetings?
- Was a Unit Guidebook purchased to share at meetings?
- Have you encouraging members to enhance their education by using the ALA online Academy and resources?
- Are you teaching members how to help other members to use computer and social media skills?
- Are you initiating new members and offering every new member an orientation packet?
- Are you offering an ALA information refresher course for all members?
- Are you encouraging members to take Welcome to the American Legion Auxiliary Senior Auxiliary Basics, A
 Course on our History and Legacy at www.ALAforVeterans.org under the Leadership tab and recognizing those
 achievements?
- Are you encourage members to participate in Mission Training or other national events?
- Are you developing a plan to assist Junior members in learning about the referenced documents?
- Are you setting aside a "show me where it's printed" at meetings where members can ask why something is done the way it is or where in the governing documents it says we have to do it this way?
- Are you asking members to review all ALA documents at all levels?
- Are you using positive, experienced members to train and guide new members?
- Do you Invite new members to participate in meetings and events?
- Do you provide unit officers/board of directors contact information?
- Do you listen and respect what other members have to say and thank them for their ideas?
- Do you provide a positive attitude and solutions to issues?
- Do you give praise and recognition when members do what is asked or go beyond what was expected?

Legislative

Thank you to all those who sent me a mid-year report. This has been a challenging time for everyone, but I am so glad to see that members are still working to promote our legislative objectives. In person visits are not possible but phone calls, emails, and good old fashion letters still can get the job done. The following is from the Central Division newsletter and contains some valuable information. Please pass it on to your unit members.

Health care for women veterans is a major concern. There are roughly 2 million living women Veterans. The VA Mission Act increased Veterans access to healthcare, adding some new benefits like "easier access, high quality care at VA facilities, virtually through telehealth and in the community", but did not specifically cover issues for women.

H.R. 3224, known as the Deborah Sampson Act, has passed the House. S. 514, known by the same name, passed through the Veterans' Affairs Committee with an amendment and has been placed on the Senate calendar under general orders (Calendar #536).

The **Deborah Sampson Act** aims to make invisible women veterans visible and to create equitable access to healthcare, housing, legal services, and other resources and benefits. Deborah Sampson was a Massachusetts woman who disguised herself as a man in order to serve in the Continental Army during the American Revolutionary War. She is one of a small number of women with a documented record of military combat experience in that war. She served 17 months in the army under the name "Robert Shirtleiff" of Uxbridge, Massachusetts, was wounded in 1782, and was honorably discharged at West Point, New York, in 1783.

Not all services are available to women or are gender specific. Many are not enrolled in the VA system because they do not know services are available to them or they do know and are not enrolled for various other reasons.

S. 514 has 54 co-sponsors. You can look up the sponsor and co-sponsors so you can see who you need to write, call, or email. Let's push to get this passed.

Second, if you know any women veterans you could bring up a conversation to ask if they are enrolled. If they are not, suggest they might want to look into it.

Our Women Veterans deserve the benefits that are given through the VA and at least deserve the option if they want to utilize them.





NATIONAL SECURITY

In memory of Martha Setlock and her love for Homeless Veterans, this is an activity that anyone can work on or help others work on. Several years ago, some of these mats were made and were distributed to our homeless veterans.

You can help homeless veterans AND benefit the environment at the same time. By collecting plastic bags and crocheting them in to sleeping mats, you can give a homeless veteran a soft place to lay his or her head and help keep plastic bags out of oceans and landfills.

Maria Mendez-Young and other American Legion Auxiliary members in California are part of an initiative to create and provide these sleeping mats to homeless veterans in their community.

Each 6-foot-by-2½-foot mat is made from 600 to 700 recycled plastic grocery bags and takes about 50 hours to make. "They are lightweight, waterproof, and, from what I hear, bugs stay away from them," Mendez-Young said.

Other groups across the country are doing similar projects. Interested in learning how a crocheting or knitting craft can help homeless veterans? Follow these steps:

- 1. **Be a collector** Collect clean plastic bags from the grocery store and other places. The bags should be in good shape and not full of holes.
- 2. Be a folder Return the bags to their original shape.
- 3. **Be a cutter** Cut off the bags' handles, as well as an inch from the bottom of the bags. Then cut the bags into $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch loops.
- 4. **Be a "plarn" maker** Link the loops to form plarn (plastic yarn) and roll them into balls like you would with a ball of yarn.
- 5. Crochet OR knit the rows:
 - 1. Crochet the mat into a 6-foot-by-3-foot mat. It is a single crochet with a size P or Q hook.
 - Make a chain 36 inches long, which is about 66 chains. Make the loops loose with a little space between each one.
 - Make an extra loop at the end to use as your turning point.
 - Start at the third loop to make your second row.
 - Continue until the mat is 6 feet long.
 - Crochet from front to back so that it does not pucker up.
 - Crochet two rows of a single crochet to form a tie that is 80 inches long. Connect the tie to the mat so the mat can be rolled up and carried like a sleeping bag.
 - 2. **Knit** the mat using size 19 knitting needles. Knit approximately 50 stitches until it reaches about 2½ feet wide. Keep knitting until it reaches 6 feet long. Cast off, and you're done!


