

Regarding Elections for the 2022-2023 Department Officers

Below is an excerpt from the Department Constitution regarding elections. Those wishing to be considered for office for the 2022-2023 administrative year must submit a letter of intent to run for office, stating which office they intend to run for and must submit an article of endorsement for the Buckeye Messenger by May 1st, 2022.

ARTICLE IV Officers – Elections

Section 1. The Department officers shall be: President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary/Executive Director and Fourteen (14) District Presidents. The National Executive Committeeperson shall be the immediate past Department President.

Section 2. Nominations for election of Department officers with the exception of the Department Secretary/Executive Director, District Presidents and National Executive Committeeperson (NEC) shall be made at the Department Convention. Any Unit member in good standing is eligible to hold office.

Section 3. The President, First Vice-President and Second Vice-President shall be

elected annually. For those offices with more than one nominee, election shall be by ballot at the Department Convention. These officers are elected at the Department Convention for a term of one year or until their successors are elected and installed. A plurality vote shall elect. These officers shall not be eligible for a second term in the same office. These officers shall assume their duties at the adjournment of the Department Convention.

Section 4. The Department Secretary/Executive Director may serve an unlimited number of terms and shall be ratified annually by the Department Executive Committee.

Section 5. A vacancy occurring in any office shall be filled by the Department President with the approval of the Department Executive Committee.

Section 6. The Department President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, National Executive Committeeperson, the Fourteen (14) District Presidents, and Department Secretary/Executive Director without vote, shall comprise the Department Executive Committee.

Constitution and Bylaws

The Constitution & Bylaws program informs and educates members of the American Legion Auxiliary on the importance and power of having properly written and regularly reviewed and updated governing documents.

Your governing documents include your articles of incorporation (if incorporated), constitution, bylaws, standing rules, and policies.

The fundamental rules of the organization state how the membership agrees to govern itself, how it will choose its leaders, hold its meetings, and policies of the administration of the organization.

Knowing the non-profit laws in your state provides the essential foundation for your governing documents at the department, district, county, and unit level.

The importance of having governing documents in place is vital. It elevates arguments

and misunderstandings and if you have the appropriate wording in place, it can allow operations to continue in an emergency.

Keeping your governing documents up to date and making them available to all members are key to a healthy organization that functions as a team to support our veterans, military, and their families.

Remember that department, district, county, and unit constitution, bylaws, and standing rules cannot conflict with national governing documents.

When the national constitution, bylaws, and standing rules change, departments, districts, counties, and units should automatically update their governing documents.

Remember I am here to assist with updating your documents. I am available Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM until 9:00 PM. My phone number is 937-602-9365.

LEADERSHIP - ARE YOU PLANNING AHEAD?

Pam Bates, Chairperson

What does planning ahead mean: to make all arrangements or preparations that one will or might find necessary or useful in advance of something happening.

Can you guess what? I bet you know! How about End of Year Reports...Reporting on your forms...Writing a narrative for that form...Award Criteria...and Elections. WOW....it's all around the corner. Most of what I'm about to share can be used with any program...BUT...READ your specific Program Plan of Action. Reading and following the directions are the KEY.

FILLING OUT YOUR REPORT FORM:

- Make sure you fill it out correctly...especially the top section.
- Know your Unit's Official Name & Number!!
- Make sure you refer to the American Legion Auxiliary as UNIT ###...not a Post
- Make sure you write in a Point of contact with phone number and email if possible
- Answer any or all questions in accordance with the form's directions
- Most Chairmen want a little explanation when you answer "yes". Just a sentence or two or refer to your narrative story note really helps

END YEAR REPORT & WRITING YOUR NARRATIVE STORY

• Review & read the Plan of Action for your program to determine objectives to accomplish during the year. They were mailed to the Unit President to distribute to the Unit Chairman or you can find them online at www.alaohio.org or you can request an email copy from the Department Chairman.

The Leadership's Plan has questions to answer that can be used in your report and there are Key Statements with objectives than be used in the narrative.

• It is IMPORTANT to read thoroughly and completely as each program has different criteria. Some require dollar values; number of volunteers; number of veterans served (be specific - "many" is not numerical); impact reports some require totally different information. One size does not fit all.

• Compile data, total numbers, activities from your members and treasurer and then determine where the information fits.

• If an activity crosses several Programs, you can decide to use the numbers on one program or distribute the hours across the Programs that are involved.

Write the narrative, and forward it by deadline to the individual who is to receive the report. This is listed in the Plan of Action.

• If we as department chairmen do not receive information from the units, we cannot report "What Ohio Does" for the programs.

WRITING YOUR UNIT NARRATIVE STORY

• The word narrative often panics people. Don't let it! You are really writing a story about what the unit did or if it's a member specific award, what they did for the program.

• Think of a member you have not seen for a long time. Here's your chance to tell that member what has been happening in the unit for the year.

• Review and read the OHIO Action Plan for awards...National and Department. Each has different criteria. Some require impact reports in order to be considered. READ CAREFULLY!

• There are also certificates that can be earned.

NEW THIS YEAR... The Member of the Year Award has moved from Past Presidents' Parley to Leadership. The criteria and the form are included in the Plan of Action.

CONFUSED...don't be...Contact your Department/District Chairman for any help or specifics.

By this time, we would have had hospital tours to all the VA facilities and a report would be given on each of them, but that has not happened this year due to COVID and the majority of them not letting us come in yet. So, I am sure by the time I get done with this article, it will be short. We pray that next year we will be able to visit the VA facilities.

I have seen on Facebook that there are a lot of units that have been doing wonderful things for the veterans. Items have been collected by the hospital representatives and distributed to the veterans at Christmas and other times, baby showers for the expected mothers and a lot of other things too numerous to mention. Please all of you, keep up the good work. We want the veterans to know that we still care about them and are thinking about them during this time that we can't physically be with them.

If you have not heard, caregiver initiatives have been established by our National President. Caregivers can now be awarded "Service to Veterans" hours which may accumulate

for hour bars for time spent providing care and assistance to Veterans within their families if they do not receive PROFESSIONAL compensation for doing so. If the caregiver lives with the Veteran, they may be awarded 10 hours a week. If they do NOT live with the Veteran then they may be awarded 5 hours a week. The onus is placed upon the caregiver to report these hours through the existing structure within their units and departments. Only the highest earned hour bar will be awarded. This change will have bearing on how we ask Impact Numbers to be reported-specifically what is included, and that information will be updated on the National website soon. So, with that said, when you write your narrative for your year end report, please include the number of hours that you spent as a caregiver, but don't forget to turn them in for your hour bars.

Don't forget that your green report is due to your district VA&R chairman by April 15, 2022 and district VA&R chairman, your report is due to me by May 1, 2022.

Objective four of the Children and Youth Plan of Action is working with the American Legion's Children and Youth program and part of their program is the Child Welfare Foundations. This foundation had its beginning in 1952 when Dr. Garland D. Murphy, Jr. gave the American Legion a large contribution that would benefit children. The Legion and Murphy entered into a trust agreement that established the Child Welfare Foundation. The American Legion Child Welfare Foundation was developed as a repository of funds from individuals who wished to contribute to the betterment of children in this country. The mission of the Child Welfare foundation is "to contribute to the physical, mental, emotional and spiritual need of children and youth; to improve the lives of children and youth through funding projects or in other ways, including youth activities and programs sponsored by the American Legion." Grants are awarded to various organization around the country advocating for children. You can find a list of those grants using: legion.org/childwelfare At the bottom of that page there is link to a list of those who have received a grant.

As of first of December the auxiliaries in the Department of Ohio had contributed only \$25. How can you help? I realize our units' funds can be stretch thin especially now with all the social restriction we have with the pandemic, so we have to think out of the box. When you login to the National ALA website under "My Auxiliary Member Portal," and click on Liaison to Child Welfare Foundation page, you can download a label that will fit around a Pringles can. These donation cans can be place at your Post. Check with other

business around the community to see if you can place a can at their establishment. Work with your post and see if you could cut hearts or maybe a spring flower and when a person donates a dollar their name can go on the cut-out and place on a "Wall for CWF."

We are still seeking children and youth to be recognized with the Good Deed Award, Youth Hero Award and the Youth Caregiver Certificate. Check with your local scout and other youth organizations to see what children are doing. Check with the schools to see what students might be doing to help and being hero to other students. The youth caregiver does not have to be a veteran receiving the care. The reason for the recognition is to acknowledge the child giving care and not being paid for his or her services.

April is children and Youth Month so start planning now. Think about planning a summer safety program that would include bike and water safety and the importance of sun safety. Invite the local police to hold a bike rodeo and lifeguards to talk about water safety. April is also Military Children Month, and our National chairman is asking us to "Purple Up" on April 15th, Military Children Day. If you have military children in your community plan an event to honor them. There is a special Military Children Table Ceremony that would be good for the Junior and young SAL member to perform in honor of military children.

April 30th is Military Brat Day. Whereas the term used to be considered derogatory, it is now used often for self-awareness to identify as being part of a military family.

Who would have thought in 2022 we would still have lockdowns from COVID-19? Yet there is no change in the status at the Ohio Veterans Home. Every time they start allowing people to return, another outbreak occurs.

We did see that all 19 women received their gifts, which included Veterans Day and Christmas, for a total of \$2,375.00. We also gave all 101 men in the domiciliary \$10,100.00 for a total of \$12,475.00. Since we did not know when and if Bingo may restart, we bumped up the sum we gave them for Christmas.

The Veterans were disappointed to learn that the V.A.C. (Volunteer Advisory Committee) was not giving them the \$100.00 per Veteran for Christmas as they would typically do. I know the Veterans count on that money for the holidays. We felt the need to surprise them by boosting the Christmas gifts to ensure they had what they needed for the holidays. I have talked to the Veterans outside the home when running errands. Veterans have told me how grateful they are to the American Legion Auxiliary, members who take excellent care of them during the Christmas season.

One of the lady Veterans calls or texts me occasionally to see what I'm up to and if I can do lunch with her. She is taking care of the Christmas planter we got last year to keep in the Atrium. She says it's about 3 feet across. She wanted me to tell all of the American Legion Auxiliary members thank you so very much for always remembering them. She was in awe of the generosity of the sum of cash.

I was hoping that I would be able to give good news after our quarterly meeting via phone on December 9th. Gerardo Navarro, Chief of Voluntary Services, reported that they are going to let five volunteers help with the recreation program in The Towers. Even though we are not permitted on the floors, we are still doing what we can for our veterans. This year, Voluntary Services sent a list of items that were requested for Christmas. We were asked to bring the donations to Wade Park. The gifts were given to the veterans every day during the month of December. I made numerous trips to the V.A. to deliver items such as puzzle books, gloves, socks, underwear, sweats, lap robes, and toiletries.




New Bremen Post 241 held their Veterans Day Dinner on November 13, 2021.


