Purpose: The purpose of the Junior Activities Committee is to inspire active participation in members aged 17 and under so they become engaging, productive members who will want to continue their American Legion Auxiliary membership into adulthood. Standing Rule 6, National Committees – Mission Outreach

Inspire active participation in members age 17 and under so they will become engaging, productive members who will want to continue their American Legion Auxiliary membership into adulthood.

- Mission-related:
 - Distribute poppies with assistance from senior members.
 - Organize and participate in service projects.
 - Offer computer/technology help to veterans with assistance from senior members. See article from <u>Auxiliary magazine on Veterans Tech Support</u>, plus more information here: https://veteranstechsupport.com.
 - o Offer help to military families and help military kids entering a new school.
- Leadership training:
 - Shadow senior member officers at meetings and hold an appropriate unit office.
 - Post colors at senior meetings, conferences, and conventions.
 - Lead opening ceremonies (the Pledge, prayers, National Anthem, ALA Preamble).
 - Shadow senior chairmen and assist with their program plans.
 - OHIO Ask Senior members to let Junior members help facilitate the Senior meeting. Have Junior officers sit with Senior officers to learn and participate in helping to run the meeting. Give them an active role in the meeting at all levels.
 - o Promote ALA scholarship benefits of remaining a member.
 - Encourage Juniors to attend their <u>ALA Girls State</u> program the summer between their junior and senior years of high school.
- **OHIO** Encourage Junior members to attend meetings and invite their friends. Encourage Unit members to sign up their children/grandchildren.
- OHIO Include Junior information in newsletter, including membership and activities.
- OHIO Hold a Junior Membership Drive and encourage Seniors and Juniors to join the American Legion Auxiliary together.

Build the Junior Activities program one member at a time by giving Junior members a voice and opportunity to participate.

- Plan mission-related activities that are interesting and inspiring to Juniors.
- Participate in Wreaths Across America wreath-laying ceremonies.
- Hold graduation ceremonies to recognize Juniors who will move to ALA senior membership status.
- Pay first year of senior membership to encourage retention.
- Share information about the <u>ALA's scholarship programs</u>
 - o <u>Junior Member Loyalty Scholarship</u>
 - Spirit of Youth

- o Children of Warriors National Presidents' Scholarship
- o Samsung Scholarships
- Pair older Juniors with less experienced Juniors to promote mentorship.

Promote and encourage Junior participation in the ALA's national Junior Member of the Year award.

- There will now be five division Junior Members of the Year.
- From those five division winners, a national Junior Member of the Year will be chosen.
- Four division winners will receive a \$1,000 scholarship. The national winner will receive a \$5,000 scholarship, plus invited to the ALA's National Convention.
- This scholarship is to reward ALA Junior members who are contributing to the organization and our mission, with a long-term goal of increasing Junior participation.

Promote and encourage Junior participation in the ALA Patch Program to teach them about the mission of the American Legion Auxiliary.

- Work on the Patch Program at unit meetings. Include senior members to educate
 Juniors about the importance of participation in the Patch Program and as a way for
 Juniors to learn about ALA programs.
- Provide year (1st, 2nd 3rd) attachments to Juniors who have achieved a patch at the same level for more than one year.
- Work with Sons of The American Legion (SAL) squadron leaders to inform them of the opportunity for young SAL members to participate in the ALA Patch Program.
- OHIO Mentor the Juniors so that they can complete the requirements to earn the
 patches during the District and Department meetings. Schedule a special meeting so
 Juniors can do what needs to be done, i.e., recite pledge, talk about the meaning of
 preamble, read excerpts to earn various patches, invite community people in to talk
 about safety, write letters or thank you notes to various people for good things, take
 some on field trips to nursing homes, schools, or library to complete patch
 requirements, etc.

Make Junior meetings fun and informative.

- Explore mission service and how they can impact our mission at each meeting.
- Encourage friendships and mentoring by planning fun team-building activities (games, learning Junior songs, etc.) and/or provide age-appropriate crafts.
- Highlight the numerous ALA learning opportunities available to members in the ALA Academy, including the <u>ALA Juniors eLearning Courses</u>
- OHIO When planning Junior Meetings, talk with Juniors to see what they would like to
 do at their meetings for a social piece. Plan activities that are fun, yet engaging, teach
 about ALA, yet mission focused, and be sure that your meeting is age appropriate for
 everyone.

DEPARTMENT AWARD INFORMATION & DEADLINES

<u>Merry Lyn Plaque – Junior Member of the Year Award</u> – This award recognizes the dedicated service, efforts, and talents of our Junior members. At a minimum, criteria should include the following:

- 1. Nominees must have been a Junior at the start of the 2024-2025 administrative year and must be members in good standing.
- 2. Juniors must be at least in eighth-grade equivalent and may win only once.
- 3. Juniors may be nominated by any member, unit, or department.
- **4.** Nominee should not be serving as honorary Department Junior President.
- **5.** Name, membership number, e-mail address and complete mailing address of nominee must accompany nomination.
- **6.** A narrative typed essay not to exceed 500 words describing nominee's accomplishments during the current administrative year, it can be electronic mail or postal mail.
- 7. Document with pictures, screenshots, or other evidence of Junior's ALA participation and activities to be sent either electronically or via postal mail.

Far too many young people are dealing with their mental health and unable to get the necessary HELP. II. Historical Content (70 Points)

- C. The history shall be written as factual narrative, beginning with the installation of 2024 2025 Junior Unit officers and ending with the summary of end-of-year reports and closing events of the administrative year.

III. Appearance (10 Points)

- A. Cover: binder for loose-leaf paper, preferably blue or red, with 2 ½" gold foil American Legion Auxiliary Seal centered on the cover or a regulation binder with imprinted seal.
- **B**. Paper: Plain white 8 ½" x 11".
- C. Page Setup:
 - i. Margins for left and right margins should be 1.25"; top and bottom margins should be 1".
 - ii. Page numbers should begin on the first page of the Historical Content. They should be centered and placed 0.5" from the bottom.
- **D.** Spacing: **Double-spaced**, with the exception of the introductory pages (Title Page, Forward or Dedication, Photograph of Honorary Junior President (Department, District and/or Unit), Pledge of Allegiance, "Star Spangled Banner" and Preamble), which shall be centered in the middle of the page. Paragraphs may be indented or in block form.
- **E**. Text: 12-point font, Times New Roman or Arial style font.

- F. Technology:
 - i. Computer preferred, but not necessarily in the third person
 - ii. Clear, concise language with correct spelling.
 - **iii**. No decorations, computer graphics, pen or ink drawings, illustrations, extra material, or newspaper clippings.
 - iv. Be original and unique in thought and presentation.
- **IV. Deadline:** Junior History Narrative must be received by <u>April 1, 2025.</u> Send your Junior History Narrative to: Department Historian, Dayna Beyer, 6013 Garber Rd., Bellville, Ohio 44813.

Little Miss Poppy Contest – Ages 6-12

Little Miss Poppy award submissions are now electronic to address postage and material cost considerations. Please refer to the rules below for submission requirements and deadline information.

- Participant must be between 6 and 12 years of age as of June 1 and be a Junior member in good standing of the American Legion Auxiliary.
- Promotional activity of the Poppy story must occur through the American Legion, the American Legion Auxiliary, and the community during the timespan of May 1 of the current year to April 30 of the following year.
- For National Little Miss Poppy consideration, participant must submit a <u>Little Miss Poppy award</u> electronic application with supporting documentation.
- All entries are due by 5 p.m. on June 1, 2025.
- In addition to the information on the award application, please include documentation on the criteria below. Accepted formats are Word document, Google Slides, or .pdf. PowerPoint presentations may also be uploaded via Google Slides. Form more information on Google Slides, please visit https://www.google.com/slides/about/.
- Judging Scrapbook criteria:
 - o The memorial poppy must be visible in all promotion and publicity submitted.
 - o There is no specific dress code or dress color for Little Miss Poppy.
 - o Promotion of the Poppy Program: What did you share and do?
 - o Publicity of poppy activities (newspapers, radio/TV, etc.)
 - o Submitted file must include the following information (both pictures and descriptions).
 - What I learned during my time as Little Miss Poppy?
 - How I shared the story of the poppy with my community?
 - What does the poppy mean to me?
 - What activities did I attend to promote the poppy and its meaning?
 - o Age-appropriate originality with considerations for neatness and creativity.
- The Department of Ohio will honor all Little Miss Poppys that participate in this program with a certificate. Further information will be included in a future Bulk Mailing.
- If a National winner, Little Miss Poppy is invited to appear at the ALA National Convention, immediately following her selection, and if so chooses, travel will be at her own expense.

Units shall sponsor contests in local schools. When schools do not conduct activities, other youth groups – including Junior members – may participate under direct supervision of the Unit. The Unit chooses their winning entry and must be sent to Department Poppy Chairman, Donella Kline, 26963 Elisabeth St., Olmsted Township, OH 44138 by <u>April 15, 2025</u>.

- A student recommended for special education classes but who has not been admitted due to waiting list or various other factors.
- A child identified as having a disability, but not in a special education class due to lack of facilities. Identification is contingent upon discretion of school officials.

Poppy Poster Requirements

- 1. Each poster shall have a fitting slogan not to exceed ten (10) words. The articles "a, and, an, the" are *not to be counted* as words. The words "buddy" and "buy", *cannot* be used.
- 2. The words "American Legion Auxiliary" must be used in the design of the poster and will not be counted in the (10) word count.
- 3. Each poster must include a red poppy.
- 4. The poster shall be on 11"x14" poster board. (Drawing paper will not be accepted).
- 5. The United States flag may be used, as long as there are no infractions of the flag code.
- 6. Posters will be judged using the following criteria:
 - ✓ 50% Poster Appeal (layout, message, originality) ✓ 40% Artistic Ability (design and color)

 - ✓ 10% Neatness
- 7. Media used shall be watercolor, crayon, powder or oil paint, handmade paper cutouts, ink or textures, acrylics, pencils, or markers.
- 8. Written in ink on the back of the poster (not attached) shall be the class in which the entry is submitted, the name, address, age and grade of the contestant and the name of the department. Each Poppy Poster must have the Poppy Contest - Cover Sheet attached and be completed with all information and signatures.
- 9. Submissions become the property of the American Legion Auxiliary. Through submission of artwork, contestants and their legal guardians' grant non-exclusive reproduction and publication rights to the works submitted and agree to have their names and artwork published for commercial use without additional compensation or permission.
- 10. The poster shall be the work of only one individual.
- 11. The label "In Memoriam" from the veteran-made poppy *may not be used*.
- 12. While ALA representatives will do their best to return all posters, it is not guaranteed. We recommend participants take a picture or scan their poster for their records.

Junior Poppy Usage Contest

All Junior Units, the Poppy Usage Contest will be held at the Mid-Winter Conference, TBD. The entries are designs of your own choosing using official ALA poppies and it may be any of the following nature: wreaths, centerpieces, tray favors, etc. This is an opportunity for you to share with other Junior Units your creative ideas. Attendees at the Conference will vote by a \$1.00 contribution per vote.

- All money collected will go to the National Veterans Creative Arts Festival.
- A photo of the entry that brought in the most money will be highlighted in the Buckeye Messenger.
- If your Unit has an entry, but no one is coming to Mid-Winter, try to send with a Unit who is attending.
- Each Unit should have a fundraiser for the Creative Arts Festival with sending those monies collected to Department Headquarters.

Junior Poppy Corsage Contest

The Juniors are also asked to participate in this contest! The Junior entries will be judged separately at the <u>Mid-Winter Conference</u>, <u>TBD</u>. Attendees pay \$1.00 per vote and the proceeds will go to the National Creative Arts Festival. This would be a wonderful opportunity to make sure they fully understand what the Poppy represents.

- Each corsage should have the name of the creator, their Unit and District
- Be approximately 3 ½ x 3 ½ and fit in a standard 4" x 4" corsage box, any larger will be disqualified
- The entries are designs of your own choosing using official ALA poppies
- The winning corsages will be used at 2025 Buckeye Girls State Session for the City Mayor's. <u>Please note:</u> All Poppy corsages will not be returned unless that is noted at the time your entry is received.

Junior Activities Patch Program

American Legion Auxiliary Junior members and Sons of The American Legion youth members can be active participants of the organization with the Patch Program. Specific patches can be earned year-round and is ongoing with three levels of patch criteria:

- Purple Level Pre-School Age 3 through Kindergarten
- Red Level 1: 1st Grade through 4th Grade
- Gold Level 2: 5th grade through 8th grade
- Blue Level 3: 9th grade through 12th grade (or 18 years old)

Americanism –

- o Have Juniors participate in folding flags and writing notes for the Pocket Flag Project.
- Participate in the Americanism Essay Contest using the essay title: "How can we support families who provide care to their Veterans?" Think of ways that you can support those who care for their Veterans.
- Star Spangled Kids educate children and youth on the history of the United States from the aspect of patriotism, Americanism, and the US Constitution. Celebrate Constitution Day Sept. 17, day set aside each year to commemorate the signing of the US Constitution. At the Juniors September meeting, celebrate this with cake or cupcakes, report on different sections of the Bill of Rights, distribute pocket copies of the US Constitution. - <u>Chaplain</u> Place grace cards for your local nursing homes, Post and Unit dinners, and VAMCs for local holidays. Ask your Senior members to help in writing a prayer that can be sent for the President's Prayer Book.
- <u>Children & Youth</u> Jr. President Alexis Terrell's is to fulfill wish lists from Ronald McDonald Housing Charities in Ohio. Juniors can raise funds to purchase gift cards, juice boxes, house shoes and body wash. These items can be to School of Instruction or Mid-Winter Conference. You may also donate directly to Ronald McDonald House in their local area or through the website, rmhc.org. Take pictures of all your donations.
- <u>Community Service</u> Send cards to nursing homes (holidays, Hello, thinking of you) to let residents know you are thinking of them.
- Education Coordinate a school supply drive to replenish mid-way through school year.

- <u>History</u> Interview the oldest members of your Unit or Post and record their answers to your questions. Begin writing your Junior history today!
- <u>Leadership</u> Complete the Ohio and National's ALA Junior Leadership Courses. Invite your Juniors to participate in your Unit meetings. Give them a role that they can help with.

<u>Legislative</u> –

- O High School students can participate in "Youth at the Booth" during election day by working as a poll worker. If this program is not in your high school find out how they can become involved. Check with your local county to get requirements.

 Legislators regarding Veterans or the American Flag Amendment.
- Certificates will be presented to all Juniors and young SAL, that have written and/or received replies from letters or emails sent to various legislators. You may include the Activity List of the Confirmation e-mail from the @Votervoice.net American Legion response. Certificates will be given at Junior Department Convention.
- <u>National Security</u> Work with Juniors on the POW/MIA table presentation. Juniors can also help in honoring our community First Responders and 9-11 Programs. Juniors can wear RED on Fridays for the <u>Remember Everyone Deployed initiative</u>. Juniors can help cut and sort coupons sent to military installations.
- <u>Poppy</u> Help distribute poppies with senior members and help to collect donations. Participate in the Poppy Poster Contest. Work with a Senior member to put together a Poppy Scrapbook to highlight your year.
- <u>Public Relations</u> When you have an event or project you are working on in your Jr. Unit, contact the local news station, newspaper and even your school newsletter/newspaper to do an article/story about your project. Remember to state your goals, along with why you are promoting/working this and ask for community participation.
- <u>Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation</u> Juniors can help collect blankets, socks, gloves, scarves, and hats to help keep homeless veterans warm. These can be taken to many of the homeless shelters in your community. Juniors can work with Senior members to help with many of the VA & R activities that Units participate in including holiday parties, Stand Downs, collection of items to take to VAMCs, etc. Also, Juniors can help in fundraising for the Veterans Creative Arts Festival. This year's National President is raising funds to help the caregivers be able to afford to be with their veterans during the VCAF.
