



#### Meaning of the Folds of the American Flag

If you've ever attended a military funeral, perhaps you noticed that the honor guards pay meticulous attention to folding the U.S. flag that once draped the casket. Guards make crisp, precise folds a total of 13 times to complete the ceremony. Much like every other aspect of our nation's greatest symbol, each of the 13 folds holds a special significance. Flag etiquette dictates that every time an American flag is to be stored or presented during a ceremony, its handlers should fold it in half twice lengthwise; then starting with the end opposite the blue field, make a taut triangular fold. Handlers continue to fold the flag in triangles until the flag has formed a triangular "pillow" with the blue field showing on the outside. It's a dignified way to treat the flag and gives a powerful touch to patriotic ceremonies.

The first fold of our flag is a symbol of life.

The **second** fold signifies our belief in eternal life.

The **third** fold is made in honor and tribute of the veteran departing our ranks, and who gave a portion of his or her life for the defense of our country to attain peace.

The **fourth** fold exemplifies our weaker nature as citizens trusting in God; it is to Him we turn for His divine guidance.

The **fifth** fold is an acknowledgment to our country, for in the words of Stephen Decatur, "Our country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right, but it is still our country, right or wrong."

The **sixth** fold is for where our hearts lie. It is with our heart that we pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

The **seventh** fold is a tribute to our armed forces, for it is through the armed forces that we protect our country and our flag against all enemies.

The **eighth** fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day, and to honor our mother, for whom it flies on Mother's Day.

The **ninth** fold is an honor to womanhood, for it has been through their faith, love, loyalty, and devotion that the character of the men and women who have made this country great have been molded.

The **tenth** fold is a tribute to father, for he, too, has given his sons and daughters for the defense of our country since he or she was first-born.

The **eleventh** fold, in the eyes of Hebrew citizens, represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies, in their eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

The **twelfth** fold, in the eyes of a Christian citizen, represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in their eyes, God the Father, the Son, and Holy Ghost.

The **last** fold, when the flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost, reminding us of our national motto, "In God We Trust."



#### **Children and Youth**

We are coming to the end of the month of November which means Christmas is just around the corner. What can your unit do to make the season a little brighter for the children and youth in your community? I hope that many of you have contacted homeless shelters, schools, and churches to know whether or not there are needy children in your community. Those children will be in need of warm clothing, coats, hats, scarves, and gloves to keep them warm in the winter months ahead. Your unit could organize a warm clothing drive for these children. You could set out boxes or barrels at grocery stores, churches and maybe banks. It does not have to be a long drive, just maybe a couple weeks. If you do not know of children in your community, items could be donated to a local food bank or thrift store. Many churches will accept such items to give to those they know will need them as they might have better access to the homeless.

Are there military families in your community? What can you do to help bring cheer to those children who could be missing a deployed parent during the holidays? All children and most adults enjoy a good party. Plan something for the children in your Post. There are a lot of suggestions for Christmas party games and simple crafts on Pinterest if you are a Pinterest user. It does not take much to plan a party. If this is your first one, start small. Maybe do a craft with popsicle sticks, a game or two and cookies and punch. There are some great coloring pages on Pinterest so have a coloring contest. It will introduce children to the Auxiliary, and you never know what memories you will be creating for a child. See if you can get the Post to join in the effort and make it a Legion Family event.



A new award this year is the Caregiver Award. This award can go to any young person who selflessly gives of themselves to aid others who need extra assistance. A young person who serves meals to a neighbor who is recovering from a health crisis. A young person who offers to give comfort and support to a friend or family member with no expectation of payment. There are many young people who are dedicated to serving others. Although they do not expect recognition, we know how much it means to anyone to be recognized for their volunteer efforts. The

new ALA Youth Caregiver Award recognizes those who care for others without payment or expectation of reward. Once the young persons are identified, the Unit can award them with the Caregiver Certificate that can be found on the ALA national website.

We are still looking for Good Deed and Youth Hero Award winners. I have checked with a teacher at my local high school who is the advisor of a kindness awareness group. I have asked her to let me know when there is a student who does something extra special for others. Check with your school, scout, and 4-H groups whose members get involved with their communities. The Police

Department will possibly know if there are any youth that have carried out an act of heroism. Many of the Girl Scout Bronze, Silver and Gold awards and the Boy Scout Eagle Award recipients could be honored for the Good Deed Award. Many of their hours are given to make life better for others. If you are not already following the Children and Youth page on Facebook, sign up to follow. There you will see many of the children and youth who have received the Good Deed award to give you an idea of what children are doing to earn the award. As an example, one young man received the Good Deed Award for his root beer float stand collecting \$500 and gave it to the humane society and then donated his leftovers to the fire department. For their Bronze Award, two junior scouts collected 145 Halloween costumes for needy children and then was nominated to receive their Good Deed Award.

SUBJECT: **Unit Bonding** 

Each year every unit has a financial obligation to the department to pay a mandatory bonding fee. The deadline date was May 1 of each administrated year. However, the DEC voted to change the deadline date to December 31.

The national organization bills the department this bonding fee for all units in the department. Therefore, it is only fair that all units pay their obligation. Each District President receives a bonding report from department on a regular basis. If you are sure that you have paid and are currently up to date, you can contact your district president or Melissa, the department bookkeeper. (740) 452-8245

The National Fidelity Bond covers all members and employees of the American Legion Auxiliary. Each Unit must pay \$6.00 for its share of the bond premium. The fidelity bond covers loss through largeny, embezzlement, theft, forgery, misappropriation, willful misapplication or any other act of fraud. This bond does not cover loss, mysterious disappearance, or burglary. As soon as a loss is discovered, an audit must be conducted to establish proof of loss. All claims are to be reported to the Department Secretary within three months of discovery.


Don't forget to bring your items for Junior President Evelyn's Special Project. Her project will be divided into two parts.



By the time you read this, it will be way into November, probably closer to December. This year is going so fast and I hope everyone is working their VA&R program. With shut downs still going on at the VA Centers, I know it is hard for you to plan your events. Please don't forget about the veterans. They are just as frustrated as we are with this. This doesn't mean that they don't have needs, because they do. There lives, just like ours, go on through all of this. And don't forget our homeless veterans.

Thanksgiving and Christmas are coming up. Plan items to give them at the holidays. Ask your hospital reps what the veterans would like to have. They have an inside look at this and are able to get items to the veterans.

Remember also the caregivers of veterans, they are the forgotten warriors. They gently and quietly serve the veterans that are in their care. These people should also be honored for their sacrifices. Taking care of people that are recovering from traumas whether it be physical or emotional is very exhausting. It takes a special skill to lovingly and patiently care for those that are hurting. Many veterans and their care givers have been or still are living a solitary life due to the current pandemic. These patients and caregivers need your support, please remember them in your celebrations.

It is really important that you share with the rest of us through stories and especially pictures the celebrations that are happening in your Units. I want to share in your enthusiasm and triumphs. As said before, there are no midyear reports this year, but I would love to hear from you what you have done in story form or pictures. I can then share them with the whole Department.

Hour Bars – Caregivers can now be awarded "Service to Veterans" hours which may accumulate for hour bars for time spent providing care and assistance to Veterans within their families if they do not receive PROFESSIONAL compensations for doing so. If the caregiver lives with the Veteran, they may be awarded 10 hours a week. If they do NOT live with the Veterans then they may be awarded 5 hours a week. The bonus is placed upon the caregiver to report these hours through the existing structure within their units and departments. Only the highest earned hour bar will be

awarded. This change will have a bearing on how we ask Impact Numbers to be reported – specifically what is included, and that information will be updated on the National website soon.
